THE WEEK AHEAD

The San Francisco 49ers will make their first appearance in the Metrodome since 1999, when they tangle with the Minnesota Vikings in a key NFC showdown. COACHING INFORMATION

Dennis Erickson enters his first season as the 14th head coach of the San Francisco 49ers.

In his 17 years as a collegiate head coach, Erickson produced an impressive record of 144-57-1. He joins the 49ers after spending four years at Oregon State, where he led the team to a 31-17 record. At Oregon State, Erickson breathed new life into the Beavers program to the tune of three bowl berths in four seasons and a No. 4 final ranking in 2000. During the 2000 campaign, he guided OSU to an 11-1 record, a Pac-10 Conference co-championship and a 41-9 victory over Notre Dame in the Fiesta Bowl. It marked the Beavers first ever 11-win season and first Conference title since 1964.

A proven winner in each of his four college head coaching jobs, Erickson has endured only two losing seasons in 17 campaigns as a collegiate head coach. He has been named Coach of the Year in three different conferences - Big Sky, Pac-10 and Big East.

Erickson also had successful coaching stints at Idaho (32-15), Wyoming (6-6) and Washington State (12-10-1). However, most of his success occurred as head coach at Miami, where Erickson rewrote the record books.

During Erickson's six-year stint with the Hurricanes, he compiled an NCAA-best record of 63-9 (.875), which included a 35-2 home mark at the Orange Bowl. In 1989, he became only the second head coach in NCAA history to win a National Championship in his first season at a school. Erickson is also one of 15 head coaches in NCAA history to have won more than one National Championship, leading Miami to national titles in 1989 and 1991. His 1989 team produced an 11-1 record, while his 1991 squad went undefeated at 12-0.

After leading Miami to a 10-2 record and No. 6 national ranking in 1994, Erickson accepted the head coaching position for the Seattle Seahawks. He coached Seattle four seasons (1995-98) and produced a record of 31-33 (.484). Erickson's Seahawks finished 88 three times and 79 in 1996.

Erickson was a three-year starter at quarterback at Montana State from 1966-68, twice earning first-team All-Big Sky Conference honors in 1967 and '68. He was also named honorable mention All-America as a senior. He set Montana State records for career total offense (3,945 yards), career passing yards (3,181), passing yards in a single season (1,189 in 1968) and passing yards in a single game (282 vs. Montana), while ranking second all-time with 126 points and 21 touchdowns. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education in 1968. Dennis and his wife, Marilyn, have two sons, Bryce and Ryan. He was born March 24, 1947, in Everett, WA.

Mike Tice became the sixth head coach in the Minnesota Vikings 42-year history on January 10, 2002. Tice has been associated with the team since 1992. He played tight end from 1992-93 and 1995, coached the tight ends in 1996 and the offensive line from 1997-01. Tice added the title of Assistant Head Coach for the 2001 season. Tice is the first person to play for and be the head coach for the Vikings.

In his first season as head coach in 2002, Tice led the team to three straight victories to end the season on a high note. It was only the seventh time in the team's 42-year history that they had won at least their last three contests.

In his last 19 years being associated with the NFL, Tice has only had three losing seasons. In his seven seasons as an assistant and head coach with the Vikings, the team has compiled a 65-47 (.580) record and has made the playoffs five times and advanced to the NFC Championship Game twice.

During his 14 seasons in the NFL, Tice caught 107 passes for 894 yards and 11 touchdowns. The 6-foot, 8-inch Tice joined Minnesota's coaching staff in '96 after playing three seasons with the Vikings (1992-93, 1995), 10 years with Seattle (1981-88, 1990-91) and a season with Washington (1989). Tice attended the University of Maryland, where he played quarterback. When Tice was a senior, the backup quarterback was future NFL All-Pro Boomer Esiason. Michael Peter Tice was born in Bayshore, NY 2-2-59) and attended Central Islip High School in Long Island. He lettered in football, basketball and lacrosse. Mike and his wife Diane have two children, Adrienne 8-4-87 and Nathan 7-28-89.

THE LAST TIME

October 24, 1999 – Minnesota 40, San Francisco 16

The Minnesota Vikings, behind 250 yards and three touchdowns from QB Jeff George, defeated San Francisco 40-16 in the Metrodome.

The 49ers kept the game close in the first half on a pair of **K Wade Richey** field goals and a 71-yard fumble return for touchdown by **CB Darnell Walker**. It was the second consecutive week that Walker scored a defensive touchdown.

Trailing 24-13 at halftime, the 49ers opened the third quarter with a 15-play, 72-yard drive that ended with Richey's third field goal of the day, this one from 26 yards out, that cut the Vikings lead to 24-16.

Minnesota promptly answered with a 10-play, 80-yard touchdown drive that made the score 31-16 and effectively put the game out of reach for San Francisco.

QB Jeff Garcia completed 14-of-31 passes for 188 yards. **WR Jerry Rice** caught a team-high five passes, while **RB Lawrence Phillips** and **TE Greg Clark** caught three passes each.

LB Ken Norton, Jr. paced the defense with eight tackles. **CB Pierson Prioleau** added eight stops and **DT Bryant Young** added three tackles, including one sack for 10 yards.

KICKING STRONG

New K Owen Pochman had an impressive debut with San Francisco, connecting on a **CAREER-HIGH** four field goals against Cleveland (9-21-03). Those four field goals were the first of his career. Pochman's 46-yard field goal was the longest he has made since 2000 when he connected on a Brigham Young University school-record 56-yarder against New Mexico.

GETTING TO THE QUARTERBACK

When Head Coach Dennis Erickson came to San Francisco he promised an aggressive style on both offense and defense. After three weeks, the defense has proven to be quite aggressive, notching a league-high 13 sacks for 91 yards and 11 takeaways – second most in the NFL. Against Chicago (9-7-03) and St. Louis (9-14-03), San Francisco recorded five sacks in each game. The 49ers had three sacks against Cleveland (9-21-03). The 13 sacks puts the team on pace to shatter last season's total of 32. The team record for most sacks in a game is 10 against the New York Giants (11-23-80).

CONSISTENT PLUMMER

Cornerback Ahmed Plummer has been a fixture in the 49ers secondary since he was a first-round draft selection in 2000. He started 38 consecutive games at Ohio State and continued his durability in the pros, starting 49-of-51 games in his career.

TOP FLIGHT CORNER

Cornerback Ahmed Plummer has evolved into a top tier defensive back in the NFL. Plummer has usually covered the opposing team's top receiver and has been up to the challenge. Since the start of 2002, Plummer has 21 passes defensed, good for eighth in the NFL. Detroit's Dre Bly leads the NFL with 26.

THE PLUMMER DID IT

Cornerback Ahmed Plummer had a great opening game against Chicago (9-7-03). He recorded his ninth and 10th career interceptions against the Bears. Plummer also returned an interception for a 68-yard touchdown, the first of his career. The last time he returned an interception for a touchdown was while he was in Ohio State in 1997. Plummer had an interception return for 83 yards against Illinois. The last time San Francisco had an interception return for a touchdown was last year when cornerback Jason Webster had a 37-yard return against St. Louis (10-6-02). Plummer's 68-yard jaunt was the longest since safety Zack Bronson returned an interception a team-record 97 yards for a touchdown against Chicago (10-28-01).

DEFENSIVE PRESENCE

An aggressive attacking defense has seen San Francisco rise to the top of the NFL rankings. Over the first three games, the 49ers are ranked second in the NFL in total defense. Opposing offenses have only averaged 218.7 yards per game, second only to Tampa Bay's 213 yards per game average. The 49ers defense leads the NFL in yards per play, with offenses averaging a paltry 3.6 yards per snap. The last time San Francisco led the NFL in total defense was 1997.

STIFF D

San Francisco's defense has played at a tremendous pace to start the season. In its victory against Chicago (9-7-03), the 49ers only allowed 127 total yards against the Bears, giving up 55 yards rushing and 95 yards passing. It was the lowest amount of yards the 49ers have given up in a season opener. The previous low was 135 against the Washington Redskins (9-17-61). They continued against St. Louis (9-14-03), limiting the Rams to only 88 yards on 24 carries. The Rams only averaged 3.7 yards per carry, with Marshall Faulk carrying the ball 18 times for 57 yards. The 49ers continued its stellar play against Cleveland (9-21-03), holding the Browns to only 51 yards on 19 carries.

SPARKLING DEFENSE

The last time San Francisco gave up less than 127 total and 95 passing yards was against the Chicago Bears (12-17-00), when the 49ers allowed 104 total yards and only 65 passing yards. The last time the 49ers held a team under 55 yards rushing was against the St. Louis Rams (12-30-02) when they allowed only 35 yards rushing. The last time the 49ers held a starting quarterback to a rating that fell beneath 21.9 was against Chicago (10-27-01), when QB Jim Miller was 5-for-16 with 63 yards passing and one interception. His rating for the game was 18.5.

STOP THE PASS

When San Francisco's opponents post 250 or more passing yards, the 49ers are 11-11 since 2000 including the postseason. The last quarterback to pass for over 250 yards was the New York Giants Kerry Collins. He passed for 342 yards in a 39-38 San Francisco playoff victory (1-5-02).

RUN STUFFERS

The 49ers defense has stood up to test against the run in 2003. They are ranked third in the NFL in rushing yards average, allowing only 64.7 yards per game. Rushing first downs have not come easy against San Francisco. In three games, the 49ers have only allowed nine rushing first downs, good for fifth in the NFL. San Francisco has only given up one run for more than 20 yards.

BELOW AVERAGE

San Francisco has shut down offenses who have tried to run the ball against them in 2003. In three games, they have held the opposing rusher to well under their season averages in 2002.

SACK ATTACK

Andre Carter started off the season with a sack against Chicago (9-7-03). He recorded 12.5 sacks in 2002, the highest total for a 49ers defensive lineman since 1999 when Bryant Young had 11. Carter became the San Francisco's first defensive end to reach double-digits in sacks since Chris Doleman posted 15 in 1998.

CARTER SACK

Third-year defensive end Andre Carter has shown enormous strides in his young NFL career. He led the team in sacks as a rookie with 6.5 and followed up by leading the team with 12.5 sacks in 2002. Over the last 25 regular season games, Carter recorded 19.0 sacks, tied for the fourth highest total in the NFL during that stretch. The Buccaneers Simeon Rice leads the NFL with 27.5 over the same span.

BALL HAWK

Replacing Zack Bronson was difficult because of his ball hawking skills and nose for making big plays. Now that he is pain free in 2003, the seven-year veteran is looking to continue his great production. His nine interceptions since week 11 in 2001 are second in the NFL, even though he missed 11 games in 2002.

ALL-PRO

Linebacker Julian Peterson has made a strong start to 2003, after a breakout season last year. Against Chicago (9-7-0), Peterson had 12 tackles lining up at linebacker and defensive end. In the next game against St. Louis (9-14-03), he showed off his versatility with eight tackles, a forced fumble and two sacks on Rams quarterback Marc Bulger. He continued his torrid start with eight tackles against Cleveland (9-21-03). He also caught an interception, running stride for stride with a Browns running back on the play. Peterson has 28 tackles, two forced fumbles, one interception and one fumble recovery on the season. He looks to improve on his **CAREER-HIGH** 104 tackles from 2002.

LINEBACKER U

San Francisco's linebacker group is one of the top units in the NFL led by All-Pro Julian Peterson, Derek Smith, Jeff Ulbrich and Jamie Winborn. The quartet has combined for 106 tackles 6.5 sacks, three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and one interception on the season. The 49ers linebackers dominated all last season by leading the team in tackles in 14 of the 16 games played. Derek Smith caused the most damage by leading the team in tackles in 11 of the 16 games played. Smith had 138 tackles and Julian Peterson had 104 to become the first two players since 1998 to go over the century mark for tackles in the same season (Ken Norton Jr. and Winfred Tubbs). The linebacking corps of Smith, Peterson and Ulbrich have combined for 326 tackles, which is the highest total tackles for 49ers starting linebackers since 1998 when Norton, Tubbs and Lee Woodall recorded 344 tackles.

SACKING LINEBACKERS

Julian Peterson, Derek Smith, Jeff Ulbrich and Jamie Winborn have done a tremendous job on putting pressure on the quarterback. Smith leads the team with 2.5 sacks, while Peterson and Winborn are tied for second with two sacks apiece. The unit has accounted for 50 percent of the team's 13 sacks to begin the season. The last time a 49ers linebacking crew accounted for this many of the team's sack was 1993 when LB Tim Harris, LB Bill Romanowski, LB Mike Walters, LB John Johnson and LB Martin Henderson accounted for 57 percent of the sack total (23.5 out of 41 sacks). The unit was buoyed by Harris' 17 sacks, the third highest total in team history.

HOME RUN

San Francisco has a staunch run defense at home, holding Browns leading rusher William Green to only 47 yards on 15 carries. In fact, the 49ers have not had a rusher run for over 100 yards in its last 13 games, good for second in the NFL.

FREE AGENT PICKUP

A free agent pickup at the beginning of 2003, defensive tackle Travis Kirschke has paid immediate dividends in the starting lineup. In three games, the seven-year veteran from UCLA has 1.5 sacks and four tackles. Before this season, Kirschke only had 2.5 sacks in his career. His career-high sack total is two in 1999 with the Detroit Lions.

SPECIAL TEAMS TURNOVER

Special teams have been a boon for San Francisco to begin the season. Over the first three games, the 49ers have caused a whopping four turnovers on special teams. The last time San Francisco forced more than seven special team fumbles was 2001.

BLOCKED PUNT

An increased emphasis on special teams during training camp has paid dividends early in the regular season. Against Chicago (9-7-03), San Francisco gave up only 4.5 yards on punt returns and forced a fumble. Wide receiver Brandon Lloyd blocked a punt in the second quarter. This was the first time in his career that he blocked a punt. It was the first 49ers blocked punt since Terry Jackson had one at Dallas (12-30-01).

SPECIAL T-JAX

During his five-year career, Terry Jackson has established himself as one of the league's top special teams players. And despite missing much of the preseason recovering from injuries, Jackson took his game to another level in the opener against Chicago. In 23 special teams plays, Jackson recorded a **CAREER-HIGH** six tackles and one fumble recovery. He also recovered a blocked punt that resulted in a touchdown. His previous career-high was four tackles against New Orleans (12-10-00). For his efforts, Jackson was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. He recorded a **CAREER-HIGH** 21 tackles in 2001 and is well on his way to reaching that standard with six already in the young season.

SPECIAL PLAYER

Cornerback Jimmy Williams made an immediate impact on special teams against Chicago (9-7-03). Williams recorded three special teams tackle forced a fumble and recovered the ball on the same play. He also added an interception as the nickel corner. The last time a player had an interception, forced fumble and fumble recovery was against New Orleans (9-14-97) when Rod Woodson had three interceptions, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

IN A NEW ARENA

San Francisco safety Dwaine Carpenter has turned his success in the Arena Football League into special teams. The 6-2, 209-pound product from North Carolina A&T spent last season with the Buffalo Destroyers of the Arena2 League. As the only veteran "street" free agent who is on the active roster, Carpenter has recovered a fumble against St. Louis (9-14-03) and forced a fumble against Cleveland (9-21-03). Carpenter has three special teams tackles on the season.

STRONG START

Dennis Erickson's 49 points in his seas on opener with San Francisco was the most in team history for a first-year head coach. George Seifert had the previous high in a 30-24 victory over Indianapolis.

TOP SCORE

When San Francisco scored 49 points against Chicago (9-7-03), it was the most points scored by a Dennis Erickson coached team in the NFL. His previous high was 47 points against Jacksonville (11-12-95).

OPENING DAY EXPLOSION I

With its 49-7 victory against Chicago (9-7-03), San Francisco established its highest margin of victory in a season opener. The previous high was 1954, when the 49ers defeated the Washington Redskins 41-7 to open the season. It was the largest margin of victory in the regular season for the 49ers since they defeated Atlanta 45-3 (11-12-89).

OPENING DAY EXPLOSION II

The 33 points San Francisco scored in the first half against Chicago (9-7-03) were the most points the 49ers had in the first half since 1992, when the team had 42 against Atlanta (10-18-92). The 23 second-quarter points were the most by a 49ers team since they scored 24 points in the second quarter against Atlanta (10-18-92).

40-SOMETHING

The 49-point explosion against Chicago was the first 40-point effort of the Dennis Erickson era. It was the first 40-point game by the 49ers since defeating San Diego 45-17 (12-3-00). It was the fifth 40-point game by San Francisco since 1998. It was the 11th time an Erickson coached team has scored more than 49 points.

THE MAGIC NUMBER IS 17

If San Francisco holds its opponents to 17 points or less, they are usually successful. The 49ers have won 36 of their last 37 games when holding their opponents to 17 points or less. Cleveland scored only 13 points in a 13-12 victory (9-21-03). The team has an overall record of 278-54-4 since 1950 when it has held its opponent to 17 points or less.

NOW THAT'S A STREAK!

The 49ers have scored in 405 consecutive games. The streak is by far the longest in NFL history. Dallas scored in 219 consecutive games from 1970-85 to rank second.

THE POSSESSION BATTLE

In 2002, San Francisco ranked fourth in the NFC in time of possession (32:00). The 49ers started 2003 in strong fashion, controlling the ball for 38:01 against Chicago (9-7-03) and 30:03 against (9-14-03). San Francisco ran 77 plays, compared to 59 for Chicago. The 49ers have won the time of possession battle in its first three games and are ranked third in the NFC with 32:45 per game.

So far, San Francisco has eight drives of 10-or more plays, four drives of six minutes or longer and two drives of over 75 yards. In 2002, San Francisco produced 38 drives of 10-or-more plays, 16 that lasted 6:00 or longer and 11 that went for 75 yards or more. The 49ers game-opening 20-play drive against St. Louis (12-30-02) lasted 12:07 - the longest drive in the NFL in 2002.

150 AND COUNTING

A successful rushing day usually guarantees a winning game for San Francisco. The 49ers have won 14 of the last 15 games when they have rushed for 150 yards or more. Against Chicago (9-7-03), San Francisco rushed for 162 yards on 42 carries. Since 1998, the 49ers have reached the 150 yard mark 28 times. Pittsburgh leads with 33 games. Denver is second with 31, Dallas and Oakland have 25.

30 SOMETHING

San Francisco's commitment to the running game not only helps balance the offense, it often equates to victories. The 49ers have posted an 18-2 record when rushing the ball 30 or more times since 2001. The 49ers had 42 rushes against Chicago (9-7-03). The last time San Francisco lost when rushing 30 or more times was against St. Louis (12-30-02), when the 49ers rushed 36 times for 193 yards.

NO SACK

The 49ers offensive line has faced some of the top pass rushers in the league and has held up strong. They did not give up a sack against Chicago (9-7-03). San Francisco has not given up a sack 12 times since 2000. They are third in the NFL during that stretch in most sackless games.

PROTECT AND SERVE

As a youth tackle Derrick Deese planned to become a police officer, however, he protects the blindside of the quarterback on Sundays. He has not allowed a sack in 24 games, including the postseason. The last time he gave up a sack was at Indianapolis (11-25-01).

UNHERALDED FRONT

The 49ers offensive success is a testament to players who were not picked early in the draft, but have established themselves as productive professionals. Tackle Derrick Deese was an undrafted free agent. Center Jeremy Newberry was a second round pick in 1998. Guard Ron Stone and tackle Scott Gragg signed with San Francisco as unrestricted free agents. Guard Eric Heitmann was a seventh-round pick in 2001 from Stanford. 2001 seventh-round pick, Kyle Kosier, has started at tackle and guard.

PATCHWORK LINE

Injuries to the offensive line had dramatically changed the makeup of the unit at the start of 2003. With injuries to Derrick Deese, Scott Gragg and Eric Heitmann, the 49ers had to go deep into its reserve unit. Second-year guard Dwayne Ledford made his first career start against St. Louis in place of Eric Heitmann. San Francisco also has started a second-year player, 2002 seventh-round pick Kyle Kosier and a rookie 2003 first-round pick Kwame Harris. The last time San Francisco started a younger combination at the offensive line was 1978 when rookies Earnie Hughes started at left guard and Walt Downing started at right guard. Downing was a second-round selection and Hughes was a third-round pick.

MAKESHIFT

With Scott Gragg back in the lineup and Kyle Kosier and Kwame Harris probable starters, San Francisco has seen valuable production from a makeshift line. In 2002, the unit of Eric Heitmann, Jeremy Newberry, Ron Stone and Gragg formed a solid starting nucleus. Former 49ers guard Dave Fiore started the first four games of the season before he gave way to Heitmann after sustaining a knee injury. Newberry and Gragg started all 16 games. Stone started 15 times, Deese started 14 times and Heitmann had 12 starts last season. The 49ers used the same starting lineup up front 10 times in the final 12 games. They had only four different starting combinations for the entire season.

HISTORIC START

When Kwame Harris started against St. Louis (9-14-03) it was the first time a rookie started for San Francisco at left tackle since 1953. In 1953, two rookies Doug Hogland and Hal Miller started at left tackle.

Already an adept pass-catcher, Beasley has 103 receptions for 782 yards and four touchdowns in his six-year career. His 7.6 yards per catch ranks is tied for third among current NFL fullbacks.

COMEBACK QUARTERBACK

Jeff Garcia has had a flair for the dramatic, leading the 49ers to nine comeback wins as a starter, including four each in 2001 and 2002. With his five comebacks in 2002, Garcia is tied with Y.A. Tittle leads the 49ers with five comeback victories in 1957.

September 9, 2001 vs. Atlanta - Began the fourth quarter with a 13-3 deficit. Garcia hit WR J.J. Stokes with a 16-yard touchdown pass to bring the 49ers within three at 13-10. Garcia then moved the team down to the Falcons two-yard line and K Jose Cortez nailed a 20-yard field goal to send the game into overtime. On the first possession of overtime, Garcia led the team to the Falcons six-yard line where Cortez kicked the 24-yard game winning field goal.

October 14, 2001 at Atlanta - Trailing 20-17 entering the fourth quarter, Atlanta kicked a field goal to push the score to 23-17 early in the fourth. Garcia moved the team down to the Atlanta two-yard line, where RB Kevan Barlow plunged in for a touchdown and brought the 49ers to within one at 24-23. Atlanta answered back with a 47-yard touchdown and a two-point conversion to push the score to 31-24. Garcia hooked up with WR Terrell Owens on a 17-yard strike with 17 seconds remaining to knot the score at 31. After failing to score on their first possession of overtime, the 49ers forced the Falcons to punt. Garcia then moved the 49ers from their own 33 to the 48 and hit Owens with a 52-yard touchdown strike with 6:26 remaining in overtime for the 37-31 victory.

November 11, 2001 vs. New Orleans - The 49ers began the fourth quarter trailing 24-21. With 11:06 remaining, Garcia hit TE Eric Johnson on a 10-yard touchdown strike to take a 28-24 lead. The Saints hit a 36-yard field goal with 7:56 remaining to cut the lead to 28-27, but could not score again and the 49ers notched a one-point victory.

November 18, 2001 at Carolina - Trailing 22-14 with 1:52 remaining in the fourth quarter, the 49ers took the ball from their own 34 and moved down to the Carolina seven-yard line, where Garcia connected with WR Terrell Owens on a seven-yard touchdown strike to bring the score to 22-20 with one second remaining in regulation. Garcia then hooked up with TE Eric Johnson for the two-point conversion to knot the score at 22. On the first possession of overtime, Garcia led the 49ers from their own 26, down to the Carolina eight-yard line, where K Jose Cortez kicked a 26-yard field goal for the 25-22 overtime victory.

September 5, 2002 vs. New York Giants - Tied 13-13 with 1:49 left to play in the 4th quarter, Garcia and the 49ers took possession at their own 30-yard-line. Garcia quickly found Terrell Owens for a 33-yard gain, then hit J.J. Stokes to put the team in field goal range. Garcia then handed the ball off to Garrison Hearst on three consecutive plays to run down the clock before Jose Cortez kicked the game-winning 36-yard field goal.

October 14, 2002 vs. Seattle Seahawks – Trailing 21-20 with 10:11 left to play, the 49ers took over on their own 32-yard-line. Garcia hit Hearst with a 16-yard pass on third-and-four to keep the drive alive, then found Owens along the left sideline for a 37-yard touchdown. Garcia hooked up with Hearst again for the two-point conversion to give the 49ers a 28-21 win.

November 3, 2002 vs. Oakland Raiders – Tied at 13-13 entering the fourth quarter, Garcia led the 49ers down the field, connecting with Tai Streets on a two-yard touchdown reception. After Oakland tied the game, Garcia calmly engineered a drive down the field, setting up a potential game-winning field goal that was missed. The 49ers regained possession in overtime and Garcia again mounted an impressive drive, going 5-for-6 for 30 yards. This set-up the eventual game winning kick by Jose Cortez for the 23-20 victory.

December 8, 2002 vs. Dallas Cowboys – Trailing 27-17 with less than seven minutes remaining in the game, Garcia connected with Tai Streets on a 23-yard touchdown reception. After the 49ers defense, forced the Cowboys to miss a 47-yard field goal, Garcia calmly marched the 49ers on a 13-play, 63-yard drive. He completed five passes for 49 yards and rushed for two first downs on the drive. He eventually found Terrell Owens in the back of the end zone for an eight-yard touchdown pass and the 31-27 victory.

January 5, 2003 vs. New York Giants – Trailing 38-22 at the beginning of the fourth quarter, Garcia engineered the second largest comeback in NFL postseason history. He then led the 49ers on a 15-play, 74-yard drive which ended in a Jeff Chandler field goal. He then reeled off an impressive nine-play 68 yard drive which was capped off by a game-winning 13 yard touchdown to Tai Streets.

GARCIA IN WINS

Jeff Garcia has played particularly well in games he starts and the 49ers win. In those 32 games, he has completed 691-of-983 passes for 7,777 yards, 57 touchdowns and 15 interceptions. His quarterback rating is 106.5.

PASSING LEGACY

San Francisco has enjoyed a rich quarterback legacy which has continued with Jeff Garcia. Garcia's current rating of 89.1 (2,076 attempts) ranks him fourth in NFL regular season history behind former 49ers quarterbacks Steve Young (96.8) and Joe Montana (92.3). Garcia's 61.8 completion percentage qualifies him fourth all-time behind Young (64.3) and Montana (63.2). St. Louis quarterback Kurt Warner is the leader at 66.6.

TWO FOR TWO

Garcia owns the two best seasons of passing to two wide receivers in 49ers history. In 2002, Terrell Owens and Tai Streets combined for 172 receptions and in 2000 Owens and Jerry Rice combined for 172 receptions. In comparison, Joe Montana's best passing season to two wide receivers was in 1990 when Rice recorded 100 receptions and John Taylor grabbed 49 balls for a total of 149 receptions. Steve Young's best season throwing to two wide receivers was in 1995 when Jerry Rice made 122 receptions and J.J. Stokes had 38 receptions for a total of 160. With 172 receptions by the team's top two receivers in 2000 and 2002, Garcia has proven that he is the top quarterback in team history in getting the ball to multiple wide receivers.

STEADY STARTER

After a slow beginning to his NFL career as a starting quarterback, Jeff Garcia has improved to 31-28 in the regular season. He is 27-14 in the last 41 regular season games and is fifth in the NFL with a .659 winning percentage during that stretch.

70-70 CLUB

Despite the legacy of great wide receivers in San Francisco, the 49ers have had its top two wideouts register 70 or more receptions in the same season only twice in team history. Terrell Owens (97) and Jerry Rice (75) were the first wide receiver combination to do it. Owens finished with 100 receptions for 1,300 yards, while Tai Streets had 72 for 756 yards in 2002. There have been four other 49ers combinations to reach 70-70, but they were either a wide receiver and a running back, or a wide receiver and tight end.

PRODUCTIVE PAIR

Terrell Owens and Tai Streets combined for 172 catches for 2,056 yards and 18 touchdowns in 2002. So far the duo has accounted for 31 catches, 389 yards and three touchdowns. They are on pace for 165 catches, 2,074 yards and 16 touchdowns. Last season, they tied the reception record for the 49ers most productive pass catching wide receiver duo in a single season. Owens and Jerry Rice combined for 172 receptions in 2000.

MAGNIFICENT SEVEN

In 2003, every San Francisco draft pick made the roster. This is the first time in a decade that all seven draft picks made the 49ers opening game roster. The 1993 rookie class, led by Dana Stubblefield, was the last group to accomplish this feat.

FAST, YOUNG AND HEALTHY

When Terry Donahue took over as General Manager of the 49ers, his mission was to make the 49ers "fast, young and healthy." San Francisco's roster has greatly improved since 1999, primarily through the draft. In 1999, there were 19 players drafted by the 49ers on the roster. Currently there are 31 drafted players on the roster. The team had two Pro Bowlers in 1999, three in 2000 and six in each of the last two years.

PROSCOUT FINDINGS

How well have the 49ers done in the draft since 1999? Quite well, according to Proscout, an independent scouting service in the NFL. Proscout ranks San Francisco sixth in the NFL for rookie production over the last four years. Proscout uses a color grading scheme to evaluate player production with blue, red and purple being positive grades. Blue represents players ranked in the top nine percent of the league at their positions, red the top 25 percent and purple the top 48 percent. The 49ers have had 22 of their 34 draft choices, or 65 percent, rank purple or better since 1999.

STRONG SIGNINGS

San Francisco has focused on building its roster through the draft while targeting a handful of free agents to fill needs. According to Proscout, the 49ers have been perfect with their free agent signings in each of the last two years. The 49ers have signed 11 free agents since 2001 and have received purple or higher grades on all 11, including six players (Gragg, Bronson, D. Smith, Newberry, Beasley, Parrish) who have garnered blue grades. The free agents signed this offseason – Travis Kirschke and Jed Weaver have not been graded yet, although both figure to play key roles this season.

EYE ON THE DRAFT

San Francisco has done a great job building their team from within. Sixteen of the 22 starters were drafted by the 49ers or signed with the team out of college as undrafted free agents. This does not include Jeff Garcia, who signed his first NFL contract with San Francisco after starring in the CFL.

ROSTER IMPROVEMENT

Proscout rankings help gauge the dramatic roster improvement the 49ers have experienced over the last four years. According to Proscout, the 49ers ranked 29th in 1999 in 40-man personnel points, 20th in 2000, sixth in 2001 and first in 2002. The 40-man category includes 22 starters, kicker, punter, return specialists and the top backup players at each position.

STRONG STARTERS

Many things contributed to San Francisco's fast return from salary cap oblivion. One factor was acquiring talent, both young and experienced, that was capable of making an impact, especially on defense. All but two of the 49ers starting defensive players was selected in the first three rounds of the NFL draft. San Francisco has four first rounders (Young, Carter, Plummer and Peterson), three second rounders (Webster, Engelberger and Parrish) and two third-round picks (Ulbrich and Smith) on their starting defense. With Jason Webster out, Mike Rumph is the fifth first-rounder in the lineup. Zack Bronson and Travis Kirschke are the only undrafted starters on the unit. On offense, San Francisco has benefited from a productive yet unheralded quarterback, a dynamic receiver and some late round steals. Jeff Garcia has been invited to three consecutive Pro Bowls after spending five seasons in Canada, and Terrell Owens has exploded into the top receiver in the NFL. Garrison Hearst is the only offensive starter selected in the first round, while Jeremy Newberry and Scott Gragg were both second-round picks. The 49ers landed four offensive starters in the final two rounds of the draft – Fred Beasley and Tai Streets in the sixth, Eric Heitmann and Eric Johnson in the seventh.

TALENTED TEAM

When the 49ers went 4-12 in 1999 it was clear that the roster needed to be retooled. They opted to build around a handful of players from that team. Only 15 players remain from 1999, including six starters, four of which are Pro Bowlers (Bryant Young, Jeremy Newberry, Terrell Owens and Jeff Garcia). The infusion of talent over the last three years has helped the 49ers blossom into one of the top teams in the NFL again. San Francisco has had 12 players selected to the Pro Bowl over the last two years, tied with Philadelphia for the most in the NFL.

REVAMPED ROSTER

A closer look at the 49ers depth chart this season shows that the 49ers have been successful with the players they have drafted and signed as free agents over the last four years. Since 1999, San Francisco acquired 16 of their 22 starters either via the draft or free agency. They have landed their leading passer (Jeff Garcia), tackler (Derek Smith) and interceptor (Tony Parrish) through free agency. San Francisco also drafted its leading sacker (Andre Carter) during that time.

NUMBERS DON'T LIE

Aside from the six Pro Bowlers on the roster, San Francisco has several other players closing in on all-star status. Fred Beasley is regarded by many as the best fullback in the NFL and was named first-team All-Pro for his efforts. Tony Parrish established himself as a takeaway machine and one of the top safeties in the game. Parrish finished the regular season ranked third in the NFL with seven interceptions and second with nine takeaways. Andre Carter ranked third in the NFL with 12.5 sacks in just his second season and Ahmed Plummer developed into one of the better cornerbacks in the league.

LAST WEEK IN REVIEW

Cleveland 13, San Francisco 12

On an afternoon where the heat took center stage, the Cleveland Browns squeaked out a come-from-behind victory as they used two fourth quarter QB Kelly Holcomb touchdown passes to defeat the San Francisco 49ers 13-12.

The San Francisco offense looked poised to put the visitors in a hole early as **QB Jeff Garcia** led San Francisco on an impressive opening drive. However, the offense was unable to capitalize as **FB Fred Beasley** was stymied on two attempts from the one-yard line by the Cleveland defense.

San Francisco dominated the first half statistics as its 158 yards nearly doubled the offensive output of the Browns. But, the Cleveland defense kept the 49ers out of the end zone on three trips to the red zone, including two times in the first half.

The 49ers did manage to build a 6-0 first-half lead as **K Owen Pochman** connected on the first two field goals of his career as he hit from 38 and 44 yards.

The second half saw more of the same for the 49ers as Pochman extended the San Francisco lead to 9-0 with a 46-yard field goal on the 49ers opening possession. San Francisco continued to build on their lead as the fourth quarter opened as Pochman added his fourth field goal of the game to give San Francisco a 12-0 lead.

The fourth quarter brought the revival of the Cleveland offense as the Browns answered the 49ers scoring drive with a score of their own. They drove 75-yards in eight plays, reaching the end zone on a two-yard pass from QB Kelly Holcomb to WR Andre' Davis with just under 11 minutes remaining, cutting the San Francisco lead to 12-7.

Following an unsuccessful drive by the offense, the 49ers defense provided a lift as **LB Julian Peterson** intercepted a Holcomb pass. San Francisco's offense was unable to capitalize on the turnover and the 49ers were forced to punt the ball to the Browns.

A strategically placed 31-yard punt by **P Bill LaFleur** pinned the Browns deep in their own territory. The Cleveland offense then mounted what would turn out to be the most impressive drive of the afternoon. Holcomb guided Cleveland on a 91-yard, 17-play drive that culminated in the game winning score, when he found Davis in the back of the end zone for his second touchdown of the game with just 29 seconds remaining.

San Francisco was unable to counter the Browns fourth quarter attack as the three possessions by the 49ers in the final stanza resulted in just one yard of offense and a turnover. CB Anthony Henry intercepted Garcia to end the game.
